### A Letter From Our EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Hello, friends!

This annual report shares some highlights from 2022. As always, you will see that the Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Eastern Kansas team worked tirelessly to fulfill our mission: supporting the healthy development of young children by improving access to high-quality child care options and educational resources for families and early childhood professionals.

The shifting landscape of child care created new challenges. While child care has always been in short supply in some communities, in 2022 the issue became widespread in ways it never had before. Child care supply simply did not begin to meet the demand or needs throughout our region. Program closures outpaced the opening of new child care facilities in spite of incentives and support offered to support the launch of new programs. Many established child care programs struggled to function at their full licensed capacity due to difficulties in hiring and

retaining qualified teachers. In response, specific outreach efforts to engage community and business leaders in identifying and implementing local solutions to the child care crisis were launched in partnership with Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Kansas. These efforts continued into 2023.

In spite of the challenges, we have much to celebrate. Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Eastern Kansas has always been known for providing support and guidance to anyone we serve at just the right point in time, and we continued that commitment to excellence throughout this year. The incredible staff of this agency is like no other, with their collective expertise and passion for the work we do. All that was accomplished was done through our partnerships with volunteers, donors, local businesses, community agencies and area foundations. These strong relationships, combined with the agency's longstanding reputation for high-quality programs and services and solid fiscal oversight, resulted in the organization continuing to offer support and solutions to all who requested assistance throughout the year.

Please know how grateful we are for all the ways our donors and friends continue to show support for the agency and our mission. We look forward to working with you as we move ahead together, meeting the needs of the children, families and child care providers we serve!

### What is Cooking with... CHILD CARE PROVIDERS In 2022...

**1,410** child care programs through the 33-county region and their staff were served by the agency.

Professional development classes in 2022 were continued to be offered by three formats: in-person, virtual by Zoom, and online. Having this variety allowed participants to choose classes that best met their needs and learning styles. In 2022, Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Eastern Kansas offered 73 classes by Zoom, 58 classes in-person and 26 online.

For over 15 years, the agency has offered professional development specifically for child care center directors and administrators. As staffing concerns elevated in 2021, the agency responded by offering the **Director's Toolbox** classes in a blended delivery model. Topics included helping teachers develop powerful interactions with young children, community engagement and marketing, conflict in the workplace, the director's role in supporting positive behavior, and theories of change. The Director's Toolbox had **two** classes held in-person, **two** were held virtually by Zoom and **one** was an online class.

With funding provided by United Way of Greater Topeka, the **Get Set for Success** program in Shawnee County had **nine** early learning classrooms participate with **91** children served in total. These classrooms received components of the Learning Without Tears curriculum, on-site coaching and professional development. The overall focus was on supporting classrooms serving at-risk preschool-aged children and ensuring they have the skills needed to be successful in kindergarten.

**Capital Area Successful Start (CASS)** is a collaborative that brings together **eight** community partners that make up the Shawnee County Early Childhood Block Grant. This collaborative is funded through the Kansas

Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund. Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Eastern Kansas joins with community agencies to serve children prenatally to age five years and their families. Partners included: TARC's Tiny-K and PACT programs, Shawnee County Nurse-Family Partnership, USD 501 Parents as Teachers, Kansas Children's Service League's Healthy Families and Fatherhood Involvement initiatives, Family Service & Guidance Center, Community Action Head Start and Early Head Start, and the United Way of Greater Topeka (serving as the fiscal agent). In 2022, agency staff provided services to 62 early childhood classrooms in Shawnee County through on-site coaching, professional development, and access to resources. All services were focused on supporting at-risk children and their families to prepare them for success in school. Through this effort 259 children were served.

Child Care Quality Initiative (CCQI) is funded through Child Care Aware® of Kansas and wrapped up in June of 2022. The year-long guality improvement focused on working with family child care providers to offer a high-quality learning environment to children ages 0-5. Participants were evaluated with the CLASS (Classroom Assessment Scoring System) tool and set goals from the assessment to increase the quality of care. Participants received professional development and coaching related directly to teaching strategies that support emotional and behavioral growth, classroom organization, and instructional methods to grow children's executive functioning skills. In 2022 16 programs participated from Bourbon, Cherokee, Crawford, Douglas, Geary, Lyon, Jefferson, and Neosho counties. A total of 135 children were served through this project.

### Child Care Quality and Improvement System Support (CCQIS)

Aware<sup>®</sup> of Kansas from funding provided by the Department of Children and Families. The main focus of this initiative is to increase the quality of care in the child care environment. Regional Community Consultants are hosting Learning Community meetings for providers which are provider-driven and provider lead. Each meeting offers an opportunity for providers to network, share resources, and brainstorm for future meeting topics. Providers can utilize the coach for help with accreditation, children screenings, goal setting, or anything that will increase the quality of care.

Conscious Discipline E-Course: Start Strong-SEL Foundations and Resiliency in Infants and Toddlers was funded through the CCQI initiative through Child Care Aware of Kansas. In this selfpaced course, participants received 30 hours of video training, hands-on application activities, and monthly group support meetings. Through this series, 56 providers were served, reaching 336 children ages 0-3 years. This comprehensive Conscious Discipline Infant/Toddler e-Learning experience provides caregivers, educators, mental health professionals and families with the relationship-based competencies necessary to create a strong foundation for optimal brain development, mental health, resilience, and socialemotional development

Thanks to a **Preschool Development Grant** (PDG) through the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund, in 2022 activities continued to address child care access in three communities: Chanute, Ottawa, and Hi-Crest Topeka. In Chanute and Ottawa, grants and coaching assistance was offered to child care programs to increase their infant and toddler enrollment capacity and classroom quality. Support in Hi-Crest Topeka focused on support to the SENT Prep Academy, located in the Hi-Crest area of Topeka which was known as a " child care desert" because of the lack of child care. PDG funding also supported efforts to update the agency's resource lending library, and a child care provider wage and benefit survey conducted in Shawnee and Riley Counties.

#### **Anti-Bias Preschool Development Grant**

During the spring of 2022, with funding from a Preschool Development Grant, Googols of Learning in Lawrence collaborated with the agency to provide training, observation, coaching and goal setting for **seven** center-based classrooms and **two** family child care programs on antibias teaching strategies. Each classroom also received anti-bias learning materials. In the fall of 2022, **five** additional family child care programs enrolled in the project and completed in February of 2023.

#### The Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC)

network is funded by the Kansas Department of Health & Environment through Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Kansas. In 2022 CCHC consultants completed an online health and safety course that provided them with knowledgeable information and resource for the providers they are serving. The goal of CCHC is to offer potential child care providers consultation and support as they navigate the licensing process, working in tandem with child care licensing surveyors. Small start-up stipends are available through CCHC to help offset some of the costs of becoming licensed, and larger health and safety grants can be accessed to address barriers to licensing. To date, the consultants have provided **195** technical assistance help to potential providers in **31** counties in our region. They have assisted 108 providers in receiving their temporary license and 121 have moved to receive their permanent license from KDHE. Once providers have a permanent license, the CCHC network refers the providers to different quality initiatives throughout the network.

**Nemours Project** is funded through Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Kansas. The agency was able to offer a training called Act Naturally which encourages participants to discover nature in their environment including how to set up an indoor and outdoor environment that encourages exploration of nature. The training was offered twice with an online and in-person optionand has had **24** participants completed the training and received follow up support on the topic.

### What is Cooking with... FAMILIES In 2022...

A total of **16,014** child care referrals were completed through the Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Kansas Parent Resource Center Operated by Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Eastern Kansas.

**8,325** families used the Parent Resource Center, either by calling or utilizing the online service.

Families recieved refferals to licensed child care programs and information on things to look for and questions to ask. Refferal services benefitted **9,415** children.

Families who contacted the Parent Resource Center also received information about community resources, and support services, including information about home visitation programs, child screenings, and health agencies.

A Preschool Development Grant (PDG), federal funding through US Department of Health & Human Services. Administration for Children and Families through the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund, focused on outreach and support activities to families in the Hi-Crest neighborhood in Topeka. From October- March, Child Care Aware® of Eastern Kansas partnered with SENT Prep Academy to offer an evening story time, Begin with a Book, for families of children ages birth to 5 living in the Hi-Crest neighborhood. Each month children were read an interactive book and completed a theme related activity with their family. Families also received a take home packet with books, activities and developmental information to support their child's learning at home.

Kindergarten Transitions support through PDG was a collaborative effort bringing together representatives from all six public school districts in Shawnee County, private schools, the Topeka & Shawnee County Public Library, child care providers, and other community partners together to support this vital time in the lives of children. The shared vision is that every family in Shawnee County, no matter where they live or where their child will attend school, has access to support and information around kindergarten transitions. The website, www.kindergartenready.org shares information with families to help them prepare their child care success in school as well as access important information about school enrollment and community events.

#### The Successful Connections program in

Shawnee County supports pregnant women and families with new babies by offering community resources to assist them in becoming more successful parents. In 2022, Successful Connections offered support services to **795** families, offering them free resources including parenting programs. Families received a handmade cuddle blanket, a child development calendar and information about area home visitation programs, child development, choosing child care and other valuable community resources. The Successful Connections Program is funded by the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund.

### What is Cooking with... COMMUNITIES & BUSINESSES In 2022...

In 2022, child care capacity in local communities continued to be a concern to business and civic leaders who found themselves in unfamiliar territory as they tried to determine how to address this critical piece of infrastructure needed to grow the local economy, Child Care Aware® of Eastern Kansas continued responding to requests for information and data for community and business leaders. Through the **Community Outreach & Engagement** work funded by the Kansas Department for Children and Families through Child Care Aware® of Kansas, presentations were prepared for delivery to business and civic groups upon request. The continued work of the **Child Care Health Consultant** network in 2022 supported local community efforts around child care provider recruitment events to build local child care capacity. (Read more about the Child Care Health Consultant work on page 4 of this report.) Agency staff continued to participate in a variety of community events including health fairs, back-to-school fairs, job fairs and other events throughout the region to share information regarding high-quality early education topics. These events served as outreach and education opportunities for local communities as well as opportunities to encourage child care as a career as appropriate.

During the spring of 2022, Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Eastern Kansas had the opportunity to begin hosting **Communities in Action** workshops, following a model created by Child Care Aware<sup>®</sup> of Kansas. These sessions brought community partners and stakeholders together to examine the child care needs of their communities and to create community-led solutions. The first Communities in Action event was held March 4th in Paola, with representation from four counties: Miami, Linn, Franklin and Anderson. A session was held in Topeka on March 24, and the Manhattan session (which include Geary, Pottawatomie and Riley county representatives) was held March 25. Throughout the year, staff provided support to local coalitions as they launched their action plans to address child care capacity in their communities.
